30th JANUARY - Gerry Riley will lead this walk of 6.1 miles from Bromborough Rake station to Hooton via Raby Mere and Willaston. We will be walking on a mixture of footpaths, fields and some minor roads. The possibility of some muddy paths is possible depending on rainfall. There is one toilet and rest stop of approx 30 minutes at the 4 mile point in Willaston, where we can have refreshments in Ashton’s café or the Pollard Inn, however, suggest that you bring a bottle of water to prevent dehydration during the walk. From Hooton we will get the train back to Bromborough, where lunch is booked at the Merebrook pub (around 300 yards from the station) for 13:30.

Meet on the platform of Port Sunlight railway station at 10:00 am. There are toilets available here to use before we get the train to Bromborough Rake station (No facilities). Trains leave Birkenhead Central at 09:30, 09:37, or 9:52 taking 9 minutes to reach Port Sunlight, We will wait for walkers catching the 09:52 from Birkenhead Central arriving Port Sunlight at 10:01. Hamilton Square station is closed for re-furbishment!

BODNANT TRIP MAY 2014

On boarding our coach at the church, our ears were assailed by a strange clicking noise, what was it we asked? I think at this point most people took a coffee break before commencing the exploration. Bothriums “Chilean fire bushes” which looked like the tree was aflame and many Azaleas and Rhododendrons, unfortunately just past their best.

Descending down to the next level we found the formal canal with beautiful borders and the lily pond which was swarming with tadpoles, when these turn into frogs I don’t think the gardens will suffer many slugs.

Then we found the “easier” path down to the Dell which fortunately saved us having to abseil, perhaps next time, it was still steep but it was worth it to see such a beautiful wooded valley with a river flowing through rocks and grassy banks surrounded by some really impressive, huge trees. We took lunch in various places, a snack bar in the Dell, the coffee shop by the entrance and for more substantial meals at the Pavilion, back by the car park. The food in the Pavilion was very good but the service arrangements were not well organised and a bit chaotic. CANAL OUTING U3A July 11th 2014

A merry crowd of thirty-four U3A members duly met outside Trinity and Palm Grove Church in good time for the 10 A.M. departure, and the coach arrived on the dot! A smooth drive through Liverpool and out into the Lancashire countryside eventually brought us to the banks of the Leeds and Liverpool Canal at Riley Green, (near Chorley). We piled out and into the Boatyard Inn where refreshments were available. The weather could not have been better; warm and sunny, in sharp contrast to the previous Friday when the walking group arrived at our lunch destination soaked to our undies! The Leeds and Liverpool Canal was constructed between 1770 to 1816 and brought much prosperity to the area with the subsequent increase in trade at that time. Riley Green is part of the Withnall Fold Nature Reserve and the scenery by the Canal there is really pretty!

Unfortunately on this occasion we were unable to go through the locks at Wheelton and Johnson Hillocks due to one of them being inoperable – not that this spoiled the occasion as we were to be taken on a slightly different route!

Suitably refreshed at the Boatyard, we sallied forth to find our lunch venue; a canal boat equipped to feed us all in style whilst wending its way slowly and sedately along the canals. The countryside was all around us – lambs gambolled in the fields whilst the ewes kept a close eye on them; Canadian geese and their young played and swam at the water’s edge – the sun shone brightly; it was England at its best!

VISIT TO MEDIA CITY, SALFORD QUAYS

On the morning of 4th November, at the unnaturally early hour of 9:00 a.m., about 40 of us set off from TPG in Alan's bus for a visit to the BBC on Salford Quays. The size of our party meant that we had to be divided into two groups: this report concerns group 1, but I understand that group 2's experience was in all important respects similar.



and I had actually heard of some of them.)

Welcomed by two young and enthusiastic BBC staff members, and trailed by four BBC trainees, we were given badges and briefed on health and safety. Suitably apprised of the risks involved in the use of stairs, doors and light switches, we were taken to visit three studios (one radio and two televisions).

First, a studio used by Radio 6 Music – the size of an average office, with a desk, imposing Mastermind-style chairs for presenter, producer and guests, a large and impressive array of electronic equipment and, rather incongruously, a piano and drum kit, to accommodate live performances. (Our guides rattled off an impressive list of presenters' names,



Secondly, in a different building, the Blue Peter studio. This was much smaller than I would have expected, about the size of a school gym, the impression of space being created by the use of wide-angle camera lenses. It looked reassuringly Blue Peter-ish – home made Halloween decorations, etc. Thirdly, in yet another building, the BBC Northwest news studio. Again, this was much smaller than expected – the presenters' sofa is only a few feet away from the cameras, and the spacious effect is created by wide-angle lenses and back projection. At the end of the evening news, when the weather presenter walks over to the sofa to join the others, she has to take very short steps because of the distorting effect of the lenses. So what appears lifelike is actually produced by an optical illusion – a slightly unsettling thought.

Finally, in a mock-up of the news studio, three of our number (all volunteers!) tried their skills at presenting news and weather items, and all did very well.

Following the visit to the BBC, we were left to our own devices for a few hours, giving ample time for shopping, the Imperial War Museum or, in our own case, lunch at the Lowry restaurant (highly recommended).

Thanks again to Barbara for organising a most enjoyable outing.
