WALKING GROUP

WALK FRIDAY 15TH APRIL 2016

The walk will be about 6-7 miles. We will start at Bidston station and do a loop around Bidston Moss after which we will head towards the coast and pick-up the Wirral Circular trail, which we will follow along the River Birket to Moreton and then to Leasowe lighthouse. After the lighthouse we will turn inland again and head to the Farmer's Arms at Moreton for lunch at about 2.30.

Terrain – Mainly semi-hard surface tracks, except for the stretch along the Birket which can be VERY muddy. (I will do a last-minute recce of this stretch as there is a road-walk alternative). Facilities along the route – none!!! So bring a bottle of water and a chocolate bar.

Meet at Bidston station at 10:15. (9.45 Or 10.00 from Hamilton Square arrives 9.55 or 10.10. 9.36 Or 9.51 from West Kirby arrives 9.51 or 10.06.) If you drive to Bidston, meet at Bridge at station entrance. After lunch you have a short walk (10 mins) to Moreton station for a 5 minute ride back to Bidston.

VISIT - LIVERPOOL MEDICAL INSTITUTION

Wednesday 27 January 2016

An interesting tour around an impressive building, an excellent lunch, good company. What more could one ask for?

We were participants in an historical tour of this Grade II listed building, found in Liverpool, next to the Everyman Theatre, on Mount Pleasant. We were welcomed there by Adrianne, our guide, who struck a good balance between information and anecdote.

As one of the oldest medical societies in the world, the Liverpool Medical Institution traces its

origins to the founding of the Medical Library in 1779. The building we were in was opened in May 1837 after a campaign to raise the funds was successfully led by Dr John Rutter.

Adrianne told us of their plans to achieve museum status in the future. Unfortunately the doctors in the area no longer rely on printed matter for their studies and research.



Did I mention the delicious lunch served in the attractive curved gallery?

Some of the leading characters associated with the Institution were totally unknown to me but I

was pleased to hear more about one of Liverpool's true heroes Noel Chevasse.

As well as the important historical medical books the L.M.I owns and impressive collection of medical equipment. Some was displayed for our perusal.

If you missed this tour I believe the building opens during the Heritage Open Day scheme.

TOUR OF LIVERPOOL TOWN HALL



We all assembled in the entrance hall and were greeted by our guide Steve Binns. The entrance hall contained a magnificent 17th century carved Flemish fire surround. The floor is of encaustic tiles which includes depictions of the arms of Liverpool and the liver bird. It has a groin-vaulted ceiling and in the lunettes are murals painted in 1909 depicting events in Liverpool's history. Below these are brass tablets containing the names of the freemen of Liverpool. Also in the hall are two bardic chairs from Eisteddfods held in the city.

The town hall was built between 1749 and 1754, to a design by John Wood, replacing an earlier town hall nearby. Following a fire in 1795 the hall was largely rebuilt and a dome designed by John Watt was added.

In the centre of the ground floor is the staircase hall. A broad staircase rises between two Corinthian columns; to a half landing and narrower flights climb from that to the upper floors.





On the ground floor on either side of the staircase are display

cabinets showing off the Liverpool silver. Including a magnificent silver galleon. On the half landing is a statue of George Canning. Hanging above is a portrait of the Queen.

Above the staircase the dome is carried by four pendentives. It rises to a height of 106 feet. Around the base of the dome is the Liverpool motto.

We proceeded to the central reception room. We were allowed to go onto the balcony. We moved into the dining room which has been described as the most sumptuous room in the building. Around the walls are Corinthian pilasters. The next room on the circuit was a small room leading to the large ballroom. Massive mirrors are placed at the short ends of the building. Hanging from

the ceiling are three Georgian chandeliers, each 28 feet high and containing 20,000 pieces. Weighing over a ton. The floor is of maple and is a sprung floor.

The ground floor contains a hall of remembrance for Liverpool service people killed in the First World War.

The town hall is not an administrative building but a civic suite, Lord Mayor's parlour and council chamber.

The tour ended back where we started and we showed our appreciation for a most interesting tour.
