BRIAN'S MUSING

The month of April brings with it, not only the beginning of new astrological, fiscal and ecclesiastical years but with our Annual General Meeting on 25th April we see the start of a new year in the life of the Oxton and Prenton University of the Third Age. So what!?! (one might be forgiven for asking); the answer depends very much on ones point of view. For those of us trying to 'keep the show on the road', the A.G.M. can be a matter of life and death. U3As can and do fail, even when they have a thriving and abundant membership. Like any living organism they are composed of a number of vital and disparate functions, each responsible for its own aspect of the energy flow that is the life and vitality of the whole being. Ideally each organ needs to be functioning effectively and efficiently and where U3As are concerned this can generate a degree of tension, given that – with each A.G.M - an organ transplant or two might become necessary as organs ,currently in use and perfectly serviceable, reach their expiry date. Some organs (the Chairman for example) are not allowed to function

But it nevertheless brings with it a sense of privilege and the honour of shared responsibility. No matter what our previous life experience might have been, one is unlikely to have been involved in running a U3A previously so it is all a bit of an adventure and this, we are assured, prevents the build-up of neuronal plaque. (Dementia) Each U3A has a life of its own and is therefore unique.

The same can be said of the committees that run them. One can certainly feel vulnerable whenever there is a change of membership but given that we all share in the common aim of wanting it to thrive, we soon seem to develop a sense of familial conviviality and support and even if the general membership is not particularly aware of our efforts on their behalf I think that we can all acknowledge that U3As in general have an indisputable, intrinsic value, the very life and texture of which we all help to sustain and augment, simply by the very fact of being a member.

Of course one can always do a little more: one can attend an A.G.M. and help re-elect existing members, vote in new ones and even offer oneself as a member of the committee. It is all very worthwhile, and knowing that, brings its own many and varied rewards.

WALKING GROUP



U3A Walk on Friday 15th March 2019.



On Friday 15 March Gerry Riley led a 6.5 mile walk from Ormskirk Station in an area known as the war horse walks. There is a load of history in this area including 215,300 horses were brought into Lathom through Liverpool from as far away as Argentina and 210,800 were shipped to France for active service. The walk was mainly across fields and brought us to a lovely spot called Lathom

Park



LATHOM PARK CHAPEL ST JOHN THE DIVINE



In April 1500 a Chantry was founded in Lathom Park. A Chantry was a place where Masses were recited at an altar for the wellbeing of the founder during his lifetime. Where a Chantry formed a separate Chapel, as at Lathom, there were often Almshouses or a hospital attached. In this was housed and cared for a number of poor men or bedesmen to whom the Chantry Priest was Chaplain. The chapel has lovely windows and carvings, the screen came from the dissolution of Burscough Priory under Henry V111 and is scarred with what are said to be bullet holes made by Roundhead muskets during the English Civil War. Our group photographs were taken in the well tendered gardens.

On Saturday 16 March I read the following article in the Daily Telegraph. ” Britain’s only listed war grave of a First World War horse is to be restored after developers planning to build on the land decided to make it the focal point of a new housing estate. Blackie an officer’s horse saw action in the battle of Ypres and the Somme. The 20 year old rider, Lieutenant Wall, was killed in action, but

Blackie survived despite being seriously injured with shrapnel wounds. The horse was brought back to Britain by the mother of Lt.Wall. It spent its final days in a horse sanctuary. Years later the horse's grave came under threat but was saved by Historic England who gave it a place in Halewood. Knowsley council has released plans showing how the grave will be incorporated in a meadow with a memorial."

We all had a very enjoyable walk which culminated in afternoon tea at the Nell Gwynne Tea Rooms in Ormskirk.

Visit to Liverpool Empire



The Liverpool Empire opened in 1860. Originally called the Prince of Wales Theatre and Opera House, it was about three quarters the size that it is today. Later it became The Alexandra Theatre and Opera House and in 1895, having been bought by Moss Empires for £30,000, it became the Empire Theatre.

Originally lit by gas lamps, electricity was installed in the 1900s. During the 1920s Moss Empires decided it wasn't big enough or grand enough, so they pulled it down replacing it with the theatre that stands today. Opened in March 1925, the Liverpool Empire is one of the largest 2 tier theatres in the country, having a seating capacity of 2,381. The next major refurbishment was in 1998 which got us the theatre we have today. The most significant change was the extension to the stage by 20ft. Without this it would have been impossible to stage any of the big musical productions that we are so fortunate to have now.

We were lucky enough on our visit to be able to go back stage while they were beginning to set up for the evening performance; testing lighting and sound.....mind blowing! As it is a touring theatre each show brings its own equipment including scenery, lighting and sound effects, all of which are set up by the visiting company.

A really enjoyable and interesting visit! Thank you Barbara for organising it. I know how much effort goes into arranging these trips. It's a pity more people don't feel able to write a short article for the newsletter after these outings so that other views are shared.
