





CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

You may have noticed that our politicians, regardless of ideological persuasions, are having difficulties in finding enough common ground from which to direct the business of running the country. There seems to be a lack of adequate structure upon which the democratic and legal systems, on which we depend, can rely.

It is not for lack of example that our politicians flounder. They have only to look at our Oxton and Prenton U3A and they would immediately find a reliable model to emulate in carrying out the business of government. Our U3A members come together from a number of social, cultural and political ecologies and yet, month after month, year after year we keep running our interest groups, our social mornings, our social outings, and our speaker mornings; and all this in an ambiance in which we are discouraged from expressing specific, political and religious points of view. (Though they do creep in sometimes).

I find this interesting given that at the moment the world is being torn apart by political and religious extremes for which people are prepared to kill both themselves and others in the mistaken belief that governance is only possible via dogmatic and autocratic decree in the pursuit of a political or religious ideology. Our example proves them wrong at every step. We do indeed have structure, nothing in nature can function without, but those of us who enjoy gardening know that the frames, arches and obelisks that we employ are there to enable any given plant to achieve its optimum form. What would clematis be without something to climb up? What purpose would be served by subjecting a plant to a structure that was contrary to its nature?

The U3A ethos seems to have arrived at a way of functioning that enables those participating to explore and experience a range of options without encroaching on the sensibilities of fellow members; a veritable 'unity in diversity.' This is not to say that we do not have both individual and collective problems in both our membership and administration but somehow we cope, mainly because we value the institution as a whole and want everyone to feel comfortable within it. Communication is vital to this process. It is essential we each feel that there is someone to whom we can express our concerns as and when they arise.

So here we are, with a minimum of fuss and bother, setting an example that the world might do well to follow. Now that is something to be pleased about is it not?



'LOCAL GUITAR HEROES' PERFORM IN GUITAR FESTIVAL

PRESS RELEASE

For all lovers of that magic instrument—the Guitar, The International Guitar Festival of Great Britain, organised by Wirral Borough Council, is well established as a key event in the music calendar. It takes place between May 20th and June 29, 2019, at the attractive Floral Pavilion in New Brighton and at other venues. It features some big names from the guitar world, including the Manfreds, Milos and Jethro Tull's Martin Barre Band.

However, we hope that a certain concert will be of particular interest to Wirral audiences, especially people from the jazz, blues and folk fraternities, but also for all lovers of guitar. The festival organisers always like to promote local musicians, and 'Local Guitar Heroes' will be performing in the Blue Lounge at the Floral Pavilion, on **Thursday 13 June, 2019, commencing at 7.30 pm.**

The title of the concert is a bit tongue-in-cheek as none of the players could claim that title in all modesty and there is a film title in there somewhere but it makes the point that Wirral *does* have its fair share of good guitarists. First items on the programme will be led by experienced jazz guitarist, Keith Singleton, who plays every Thursday in the Panorama Lounge at the Floral. The group will be performing jazz standards from the Great American Song Book, and the guitar aspect will demonstrate clever chord work and rippling solos.

This will be followed by the Mike White Group, playing a mix of swing, Latin American and blues, with a jazzy flavour. Mike will deliver additional sounds and styles from his 'axe'. (Actually a Fender Telecaster guitar, modified to meet Mike's stylistic needs). He will be backed by Robin Thomas (Keyboards), Tim Price (LIPA bass guitar wizard) and drum ace Tom McGuire. Mike has for number of years been guitarist and Musical Director for a series of shows at Fort Perch Rock, New Brighton, featuring legendary Elvis Presley guitarist, James Burton. So, you will be one step away from greatness—Mike has played with James Burton, and Burton has played with Presley.

So that's the first half, a jazz-themed section. After the interval, we move into a more acoustic environment. Wirral-based Phil Chisnall, a veteran of the festival, and an accomplished acoustic player, singer and teacher, will present a selection of originals and covers. To complete the concert, we have a trio led by experienced acoustic guitarist and folk/blues singer, Roger Parker, organiser of the Wallasey Folk Club for many years, together with versatile folk/Irish and contemporary guitarist/singer, Martin Pope with Robin Thomas on bass. Expect 'St .James Infirmary' and 'Darcy Farrow' and other soulful songs.

We are hoping to create a really warm atmosphere and we invite lovers of guitar, especially jazz, folk and blues to help fill the place. We hope also that people will support the festival as a whole. There is something special about the guitar and about live music. The performers will be happy to chat about their music and their instruments to any enthusiasts and aspiring guitarists, in the interval and after the show. After all, we need to encourage the next generation of finger pickers and plectrum people, for future festivals, maybe Woodstock, Newport (US) or Glastonbury!

Additional Information

1. Guitarist Keith Singleton has been presenting a charity guitar afternoon at the Floral on Thursdays (12.30 to 3.00) for a number of years and has raised thousands of pounds for Cancer Research UK. Around five years ago, his wife Bernie was diagnosed with cancer,

and together, they threw themselves into fund raising for the charity. Bernie became known as 'Bernie Bucket' because she was never far from a collecting bucket. Bernie died just over two years ago, but Keith, supported by some of the musicians in this concert, has continued these regular sessions in the Panoramic Lounge at New Brighton's Floral Pavilion. One of these sessions in the lead-up to the concert could provide a media photo opportunity

- 2. A point of interest to media could be the age profile of the participants in the concert, in that 5 out of 9 participants are aged over 70. This is a good story and shows that people can continue to play music well into retirement. However, given that young people are often very keen on guitar music, we hope to attract young people to the concert, where they will have a chance to chat to some of the 'oldies' about guitars and amplifiers.
- 3. I am the organiser of this concert within the overall festival. I wanted to offer a varied concert of jazz, folk and blues because I play in groups which perform this music. I have very broad tastes in music and I am hopeful that here is an audience out there which can enjoy the full range of music on offer. I am very happy to be interviewed anywhere and at any time, in the lead up to the concert.



VISIT TO VIEW THE CHARLES RENNIE MACKINTOSH EXHIBITION AT THE WILLIAMS GALLERY ON MAY 15TH 2019









For our May 2019 meeting, members of the Art Appreciation group attended the Walker Art Gallery, Liverpool to view 'Charles Rennie Mackintosh-Making the Glasgow Style' (until August 26th).

Inspired by rapid industrial growth and corresponding cultural developments, Glasgow laid claim to have become the second city of the British Empire by c.1900. It gave birth to the only true Art Nouveau movement in Britain, associated with the Aesthetic Movement and later the Arts and Crafts Movement.

Charles Rennie Mackintosh (1868-1928) was born in to this vibrant atmosphere and soon developed into a promising architect and designer. He was interested in both exterior construction and interior design. His finest examples of the former are considered to be Scotland Street school and the second phase of the Glasgow School of Art. Whilst in the latter sphere, his masterpiece is considered to be Hill House, Helensburgh, home of Blackies, the publishing family.

He was also fond of designing tea-rooms containing the famous delicate high-backed chairs. Miss Cranston's Willow Tea-Rooms were restored and re-opened in 2018.

Mackintosh and his friend James McNair attended technical school and Glasgow Art School where they met the MacDonald sisters, Frances and Margaret. They became known as the 'The Four' and a double romance developed. James married Frances and Charles married Margaret.

Mackintosh became a partner in Honeyman, Keppie and Mackintosh. In 1901/2 they submitted comprehensive drawings in the competition to design Liverpool's Anglican Cathedral but were unsuccessful. The similarity to Giles Gilbert Scott's winning entry is immediately recognisable.

In July 1914, the Mackintoshes left Glasgow for Walberswick in Suffolk. As an 'incomer' Charles was arrested in 1915 on suspicion of being a German spy as the police found letters from German and Austrian friends. As a result, he was banned from the counties of Norfolk, Suffolk and Cambridgeshire! They moved to Chelsea and soon became members of fashionable London Society while continuing to work hard on designing furniture etc.

Charles died of cancer in 1928. Margaret survived him until 1933. (Frances McNair died in 1921 and James in 1955).

The recent history of the Glasgow School of Art has not been a happy one. Following a serious fire in 2014, a four-year reconstruction programme was still incomplete when, in 2018, another major blaze caused further damage and loss. The building is again undergoing reconstruction with, it is hoped, better quality materials and a sounder knowledge of fire precautions and procedures.

Our thanks to Bernadette Hamilton for arranging this interesting visit.
