Ancient Gods & Old Masters - Art Appreciation Group

Presentation by Bernadette Hamilton





On October 18th Bernadette gave us an entertaining and illuminating talk on paintings featuring the Ancient Gods, worshipped by Greeks and Romans. She used the works of four artists to illustrate:

- 1. Botticelli's "Birth of Venus" painted in 1485 and "Mars & Venus" painted in 1483;
- 2. Titian's "Titus & Ariadne" painted in1522-3 and "Diane & Actaeon" painted 1556-9:
- 3. Rubens, "The Judgement of Paris" painted in 1636,
- 4. Valazquez's "Rokeby Venus" painted 1647 and "Las Hilanderas", painted in 1657

Bernadette included the back stories of some of the Gods featured in the paintings. The latter appeared to have existed in some parallel universe and tales of their relationships and lives were highly entertaining.

Many thanks Bernadette for yet another insight into the lives and ideas that inspired some of the world's greatest artists!

A Surprise talk: "Across the Mersey" on October 26th

Members who attended the meeting on October 26th enjoyed an unexpected but really interesting talk from Gavin Hunter, about the Mersey and all its Piers, past and present; who would have thought there were so many! It was illustrated with some wonderful photos of the river, going back to the days of sail up to the present day. Sadly, as it was unexpected, the audience was smaller than usual but very appreciative. Gavin has talks on several fields of local interest and we hope to invite him back.

A Son to be Proud of: Barbara Winstanley tells us why.

Stan is a 44year old RAF chief technician with over 25 years of service and is nearing the finish line of an awe inspiring charity run. Come rain or shine, he's laced up his

running shoes for more than 1,000 consecutive days, covering a jaw dropping distance greater than that from London all the way to Tokyo! Stan embarked on this Herculean challenge with a dual mission: to support the RAF Association (RAFA), a lifeline for veterans and air force families, and Cancer Research UK. When he crosses the finishing line at the end of 2023, Stan will have run an astounding 6,800 miles – that's like sprinting across continents!

So far he has completed over 1,000 days of running 10km. and has covered over 7,500 miles eclipsing the original target with months to spare. This was achieved without any rest days; 2021, 2022 and 2023 straight. Stan is closing in on having run for three whole years at the rate of 10km every day!

He says: "Both charities are worthy causes. I've seen friends and family suffer with cancer and being in the RAF myself, have seen the support that RAFA gives to people." Stan has completed these 10k's either on; group park runs, race events or individual efforts, running half marathons in London and the annual 10k races in Nottingham and Lincoln in the process, as well as completing The Great North Run, and even jogging on a canal holiday in the Midlands.

Stan: "The longer you do it the more imperative it is that you carry on. It has been more of a mental game than anything now; it's important to maintain the motivation to get out and do it, it's mostly about perseverance"

So far Stan has raised £350 for RAFA and more than £250 for Cancer Research UK. He hopes to raise considerably more. If you would like to help you can do so by visiting JustGiving pages for RAFA fundraising, or Cancer Research UK fundraising.
