U3A Fit for the Future Conference – Warrington

Corinne Whitham, Margaret Cullen and Carole Lapping attended the conference on behalf of Oxton and Prenton U3A. It was a chance to meet Liz Thackeray, the new chair of the Third Age Trust. As part of a nationwide tour of the movement she was presenting a consultation document which offers solutions to how we can develop communication and governance arrangements that meet future requirements, and which better reflect the nature of our organisation. She wants to bring board and trustees closer to the members. Carole commented that "It was a very good day with lots of networking with other N.W. groups and new links were forged, with new avenues to explore" The national picture is very similar to all the branches in that recruitment of volunteers willing to become committee members is difficult.

Su Thompson - Victorian Millinery and Prostitution













Su Thompson began a fascinating talk on this subject by explaining the trade of a milliner. We learned that making caps and cloaks and adorning hats requires significant skill and many girls were trained from the age of 14 through apprenticeships. The occupation was very difficult and when working by candlelight was very hard on their eyes. Successful entrepreneurs could become wealthy businesswomen; however, the girls were paid poorly and it is possible they looked for secondary employment.

We were given some figures to think about. In 1887 the Lancet stated there were 80,000 prostitutes in London. Research by reporter Henry Mayhew of London poor, gave the occupations of 'disorderly prostitutes' and the largest number (646), were milliners.

Su spoke of the paradox of the Victorian period with the story of covered piano legs and the moralistic novels and plays where shame was attached to the prostitute - the 'fallen woman'. In reality, men were seen as 'needing' to use women for sex and some wives turned a blind eye to their husbands' use of the sex trade as it relieved them of the burden of pregnancy and disease.

Su's interesting and entertaining talk ended on a lighter note with a discussion about the connection between prostitution and clothing. I think most of the women present had a quick look round the audience and we all thought of the contents of our own wardrobes!

Art Appreciation







The Art of Bob Dylan presented by Jane Patterson-Wright

Castle Fine Art gallery has branches in many city centre high streets, it sells original art, limited edition Giclee prints and contemporary sculptures by varied modern artists including Billy Connolly, Jonny Depp and Ronnie Wood. Jane Patterson-Wright works for the Liverpool gallery and made time to come and give a talk about the art of singer songwriter and Nobel prize winner, Bob Dylan which she accompanied with numerous photographs, books and a framed print.

Dylan's art first came to public attention in 1968 when it was used on his album covers and Jane started her presentation with an image from the cover of his Self Portrait album, before moving on to his later work inspired by his time on the road – showing us urban landscapes of highways, bridges, trains and buildings and his explorations with colour. 'Mondo Scripto' - prints of his handwritten lyrics illustrated with pencil drawings, showed us a change in his artistic direction and Jane discussed the quality of his screen prints before finally she quoted Dylan as saying that because he had been around iron all his life he also enjoyed working in metal and she described the furniture and sculptures he made.

The conversation we took with us from this talk was that we all thought we knew Bob Dylan, we've all heard his music, it's been a familiar part of Western culture for the last 60 years - but this was a side that was new to us and it made us realise how multi-talented he is with images as well as words.
