It is more difficult to see humanity as a whole and harder still to see the individual, divided psyche as a whole; but we need to try and the current situation gives so many of us an unexpected and invaluable opportunity.

I've been Zooming Around During this Crisis. Have You?

Now I am not talking about driving over the speed limit or even running instead of walking or dare I say tuning up your mobility scooter; No, I am talking about Video conferencing!

Now I am sure many of you have heard of this and may be quite a few of you have been using it yourselves. So, for those people, you need not read further unless you wish to.

First what is Video conferencing, of which Zoom is one very popular example? Well it is the ability to have communication between parties, not only by voice as you do when using your telephone but a significant extra that allows you to see the people you are communicating with. This communication does not take place using the traditional telephone network, but as you might have suspected, via the Internet; that wonder (or curse) of the modern era.

It is very interesting to note that if you go back to the 1950s or 60s and to be honest even into the 70s there have been a proliferation of science fiction books predicting all manner of futures. Many talking about routine trips to Mars and bases on the moon, flying cars and working weeks of just 1 day or less because of the proliferation of microcomputers, which weren't that micro anyhow. However, hardly anyone predicted the massive rise of the Internet and its greatest companion the smart phone or tablet, together with wireless communication both in the home and outside. It is this fusion between the smart phone or tablet and the internet that has made Zoom and other video communications possible on a wide scale basis. A significant inclusion on all tablets or smart phones is the built-in microphone and camera, which is important as it avoids having to buy these as separate items and add them, with all the extra complexity that could bring.

I find it fascinating when having more recently viewed 2001 A Space Odyssey, first shown more than 50 years ago, that one of the protagonists travels to the moon base via a large space station and, whilst there goes into a "phone booth" to have a video call with his young daughter. Where are our moon bases and space stations that ordinary people can travel to even 19 years after the prediction was supposed to happen? However, equally we don't have to use phone booths anymore when out and about. I guess the closest to our smart phone was the hand-held communicators used in Star Trek, but even here they are voice only and they can only be used for that purpose not all manner of other functions. Yet equally the people in the show can teleport anywhere, have instant medical diagnosis and can travel faster than light. Yet another example of how predictions are far from perfect.

This form of communication has been a Godsend during this lockdown, enabling families and friends to still see and talk to each other when normally they might well

have been meeting in person. Zoom in particular, has taken off in a big way. There are several competing technologies as well; WhatsApp, Facebook Messenger, Microsoft Teams and quite recently Google's own version available inside Gmail.

What makes Zoom and Microsoft teams better is that that they are not just available for one to one or small numbers of users, but they can easily be adapted to large-scale meetings of the under of 100+ participants. In the latter case it is imperative, that a host can control who can speak and be seen to ensure that too many do not try to talk at once. Also Zoom can allow participants to virtually raise their hand using a button to signal they wish to ask a question. They can also send questions by text if preferred. It is also possible to share documents and pictures from your computer or tablet with others in the meeting.

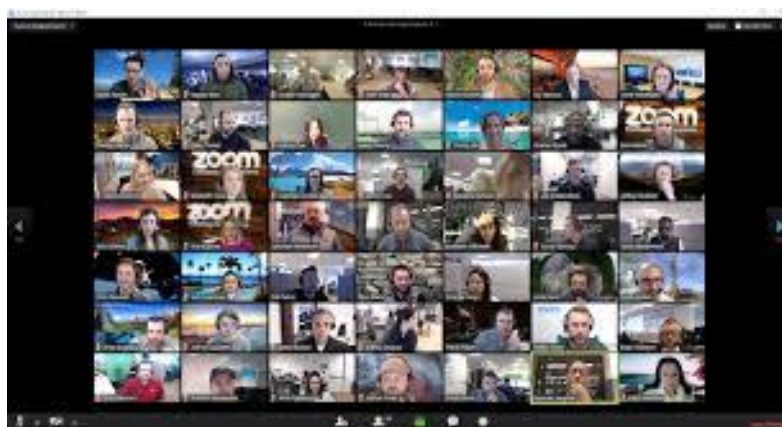
I personally have now used Zoom for:

1. Talking with family members and even having on-line quizzes with them
2. Talking with a bunch of friends in the Ramblers that I normally go out walking with.
3. Attending several on-line seminars that are of interest to me.
4. As some may know I run a U3A group for debating various issues. I have used Zoom during the lockdown to continue the debates virtually with up to 5 participants.

As I am retired, I do not need to have work related meetings, but Zoom has been used very successfully for this and has enabled so many more people to work from home. Who knows many may continue this practice after the crisis is over, reducing traffic congestion and carbon emissions and making public transport less crowded. It is also interesting to note that Zoom has even been used to make a series of short TV programs about the lockdown, where each actor remained in their own home and Zoom is even used in the daily Corvid-19 government briefings for the journalists to put their questions to the minister and science or technical representative.

So who knows we may well be having our AGM via Zoom in the not too distant future!
