An Embroiderer's Tale

As someone interested in all handicrafts involving textiles I had been long been looking forward to Tina Saunder's talk on embroidery. What a nice start to the year. But I was delighted to discover that her 'Embroiderer's Tale' presentation offered so much more.

Tina began by telling us of her apprenticeship at the Royal School of Needlework. She had brought along some impressive examples of her coursework – although not her final piece, an embroidered 3D model of Wembley Stadium!

In order to make a living she had to work multiple jobs – and in her fast talking style she told humerous stories about employment in famous London workshops and doing personalised embroideries for everyone from David Beckham to Dame Edna Everage, alongside embellishing wedding shoes at Jimmy Choo Couture.







After gained a design degree from U.A.L. Tina joined the Royal Household. She was there in her dream job for five years working on many prestigious dresses for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth. We saw instantly recognisable photos of embroidered and beaded outfits worn for Royal Ascot, weddings, royal tours and Jubilee celebrations – all with the same beautiful craftsmanship.

We also gained Buckingham Palace insider information of everything from royal corgis and the Queen's famous sense of humour to how to tell when the monarch was not happy. It was interesting to hear about the secrecy behind making the dress worn when 'The Queen' jumped out of the helicopter to open the 2012 London Olympics.

Finally displaying work from her own business as Needles and Sparkles based in West Kirby, Tina ended her talk and was warmly thanked by her audience.
